Twice a year I usually visit Victoria, BC to see my brother Steve and his family. One of my favorite things is having a coffee with Bruce Saunders, programmer of a screening series he has organized for the last 26 years called Movie Monday. Located in the back of a hospital called the Eric Martin Pavilion the series is dedicated to supporting new independent works and mental health films. As Bruce wrote on his website, "MOVIE MONDAY started as a sparky idea from a guy recovering from a severe depression and second suicide attempt. While still in the hospital I had discovered a 100-seat lecture auditorium with a video projector, and the idea of showing films there for patients and ex-patients had captured my imagination."

And so with hutzpah and eventually Canada Council funding he assembled a screening series which grew over the years. He often phoned directors at the end (as he once phoned me) and engaged in a discussion about various films. He arranged a Q&A with psychiatrist Dr. Dean Brooks head of Oregon State Hospital when One Flew Over Cuckoo's Nest was shot there. Bruce was progressive and supported a lot of great independent Canadian work. He often tipped me to films I wasn't aware of. As he says, "Really powerful movies grab us and involve us, convince us. They take us by the ears and make us hear and see it their way. It can be the best of experiences to be involved so thoroughly. Das Boot, Ordinary People, Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf, Fearless, Straw Dogs, and King Lear are just a few of the movie experiences that absolutely involved me."

When the COVID19 virus hit Movie Monday had to shut down like all independent theatres around the country. Bruce told me to reopen he would have to reduce the seating capacity to 12-16 and he just couldn't see it working anymore so he has decided to close. So here is a toast to Bruce who overcame hard times and dedicated many years to use his creative vision to make a difference in his community and a difference in people's lives.

Followed by sweet feedback from across the country.....
