Fellow members, this report is a pleasure to write because of the good news content.

The Federal Government, through the Opportunities For Youth Program has granted us the sum of \$5280!!! On May 13th, twelve of us went to City Hall as a delegation to speak to City Council. The Council voted the following Tuesday to give us a grant of \$3000. So we have over \$8000 in our treasury and what we have to do now is decide how we want to spend it. Everyone should be thinking about this and make their ideas known.

Welfare Opportunities Program

The Welfare Opportunities-Program has a deal that allows people receiving welfare to earn an extra \$50 a month for 30 hours a month work with some community group. George Laurie has been approved by the Program to work for MPA. His is a test case, and it seems likely that others will also be able to earn \$50 a month for working with us. So if you're on welfare and are interested in making this extra money, see Lanny or Barry.

MPA House is really getting into shape. It is almost completely decorated and furnished, and we are ready to begin our next step of setting up a training program to prepare volunteers to talk on the phone and in person with disturbed people who get in touch with us for help. We have sent off 175 letters to all psychiatrists, hospitals and service groups in the lower mainland, asking them to help us with our training program. This program will be getting started soon, so if you're interested in volunteering, get in touch with Barry at MPA House and get your name on the list. You'll probably find the training course interesting. In order to make MPA work, we really need people to donate some time to talk with people who need help.

As most of you know, Henry Venega, who owns a lovely farm in Matsqui, has said that we will be able to use an old house on the farm as a rural branch of MPA. Now that we have the working capital we will be ready to take charge of the farmhouse July 1st. Henry has indicated that July 1st would be fine with him. At a meeting of the Central Committee on May 19th, it was decided that Stan Mailey would be in charge of getting the farmhouse operational. Stan will be going out to see Henry soon to make the necessary arrangements. It was proposed that 4 or 5 people who are willing to work, move into the farmhouse with Stan to paint the house, fix it up, furnish it, plant a garden, make a picnic area, etc.
