

Redirection Through Education

Redirection Through Education (RTE) is a community mental health program that provides supported education to consumer/survivors and others who are experiencing emotional or mental health difficulties. RTE assesses and teaches interpersonal, communication and vocational skills in a classroom-based setting, and in work placements. Counsellors work with students individually to set goals and identify strategies to develop personal and vocational plans.

RTE provides training for social work and counselling students from a variety of educational and training institutions.


For You Program

The For You program is a holistic, experiential, broad-based rehabilitation program for people with chronic mental health difficulties. Students develop resilience and adaptability through awareness and development of physical, psychological and emotional skills. Learning takes place in a supportive group environment that stresses responsibility, co-operation, compromise and conflict resolution.

The program provides consultation with students and their outside supports, and linkages to recreational opportunities in the community. It also teaches Life Skills, including problem solving, health and wellness and decision making.

Both programs are part of the Faculty of Community Services and Health Sciences of George Brown College.

The For You Program receives funding from the Ontario Ministry of Health. RTE receives funding from both the Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities.
